Dear Dr. Weinbaum:

The North Carolina Medical Board (“Board”) has concluded its investigation related to the action taken against your Florida medical license by the Florida Board of Medicine (“Florida Board”). It is the Board’s decision not to commence formal proceedings against your inactive North Carolina license to practice medicine at this time. However, the Board did vote to issue you this public letter of concern. The Board does not consider a public letter of concern to be a disciplinary action or a limitation or restriction on your license.

On September 20, 2012, Patient A was arrested and charged with indecent exposure. Patient A indicated that if he were to be arrested, he would commit suicide. Patient A was involuntarily brought to the hospital where you were employed. You admitted Patient A for overnight observation and the following morning determined that he was not a suicide risk and discharged him back to the police. The next day, Patient A committed suicide. As a result of Patient A’s suicide and information provided to the Florida Board, an administrative complaint was filed against you on March 13, 2015, alleging that you had not performed a thorough examination of Patient A. The complaint was resolved on August 18, 2015, by a Final Order and Settlement Agreement (“Florida Agreement”) that provides as follows:

1. You were issued a letter of concern by the Florida Board.
2. You were required to complete continuing medical education in risk management.
3. You were required to pay a fine and costs.

Although your North Carolina medical license has been inactive since January 11, 2016, please be advised that the Florida Agreement and the underlying facts and circumstances surrounding it will be taken into account in the event that you apply to reactivate your North Carolina medical license.

This letter is a public record within the meaning of Chapter 132 of the North Carolina General Statutes and is subject to public inspection and dissemination as required by that law. It will be reported to the Federation of State Medical Boards; however, it will not be reported to the National Practitioner Data Bank.
